- Rob Dapice: Thinking broader than understood originally. Seed for this conversation - interventions that address homelessness right now. What are we missing? Are there ways that we should consider our investments separately? INTERIM solutions. A step towards achieving long term home solutions.
- Senator Gray: Density. In order to get water and sewer - in the center of town. If you go outside of water and sewer - there is an additional expense. a. Where you have water and sewer - someone else has tried to build there.
- Chris Schleyer: Campgrounds - cannot be operated in the winter months. Could seasonal camp grounds be permitted to use in the wintertime - that could be a temporary solution. Where is the leech field. The time with these alternative homes is in development - not in building. It is going through the process of identifying the space and making it accommodating.

A Brief Review of Incarceration Data in NH, New Hampshire Center for Justice and Equity, Jo Porter, MPH, Strategic Advisor, The New Hampshire Center for Justice and Equity

- Jo - 50% of our land = 15% of our population
- Demographic profile is growing - most of the gain is in migration to the state.
- More deaths than births
- Young population is more racially diverse than ever.
- Communities of color live all across the state
- Language: How do leverage this new population as a resource? Think of NH as a set of folks with diverse experiences, backgrounds, etc. and weave it into the work that we do.
- National problems transpire in NH too
- Incarceration in NH: Federal (700), State Prisons (1700) and Jails (1200) people on any given day.
- Jails: race and ethnicity is not broken out separately, transient, fluctuation
- County facilities
- 3 adult prisons in the state of NH (2 in Concord, 1 in Berlin)
- How many people in the Berlin federal prison are NJ residents?
- The National narrative seems to be aligned with the state's numbers
- County data collection is more variable
- There would be a tremendous benefit to standardize data collection.
- Locality plays a crucial role
 - Recidivism
- Who foots the bill for changing all of the data systems?
